370 years ago, after 30 years of war and destruction, a new form of peace was achieved: with the end of the military conflict through the conclusion of international treaties treaties and not through the victory or surrender of warring parties. That is the Peace of Westphalia of 1648.

These peace negotiations gave rise to the "Westphalian system", based on the principles of sovereignty, territoriality and the equality of states. It is still one of the pillars of our coexistence under international law.

In the Peace Hall of our town hall you will find the motto: "Pax Optima rerum", which translates as "Peace is the highest good".

It stands for the tradition of keeping Münster alive as the city of the Peace of Westphalia and to keep the historical legacy alive in the present and future.

There is no doubt that peace gives rise to togetherness and promotes peace our community and cohesion. But the claim to peace also challenges us anew every day.

Because even though each of us knows and strives for peace. Peace is fragile and unfortunately not a given matter of course.

But in view of the situation we find ourselves in, it is clear that elementary values such as peace, mutual respect, tolerance and justice are more important than ever. They are a prerequisite for the successful coexistence of people, nations and cultures.

The power of the peace order of the Peace of Westphalia has never diminished. Today, with the award ceremony in Münster, it strengthens the idea of a peaceful community, in Münster, in Germany, in Europe and in the world - not only in people's minds, but also in their hearts.

This year's winners of the Westphalian Peace Prize have rendered outstanding services to peace in a very special way.

They are great role models for active advocacy of peace, for our greatest good, "Pax Optima rerum".
